## The WYSH (Worcester Youth Speak Honestly) Project 2024 runs July 12-13 at the JMAC!

Worcester, Mass. (July 1, 2024) The Hanover Theatre and Conservatory for the Performing Arts (THT) is pleased to present The WYSH (Worcester Youth Speak Honestly) Project. Now in its fourth year, the captivating WYSH Project brings together the powerful voices of Worcester teenagers culminating in three public performances at the BrickBox theatre in the Jean McDonough Arts Center (JMAC) July 12-13, 2024.

All performances are free and include a talkback with the cast after the show. Reserve your seats today!

According to Meghan Montaner, president of conservatory & education division at The Hanover Theatre, "We know that the youth in Worcester have powerful stories to tell right now, and we are eager to provide them with the space to do so. Theatre creates an incredible opportunity for us to share the diverse stories of our community. The collaborative nature of devised theatre allows each unique voice to be heard in a safe, supportive environment."

The WYSH Project is a year-long program that includes creating an original piece of theatre, a tour of the show to Worcester Public High Schools, a scholarship to take classes in the conservatory and regular meetups throughout the year to see Broadway and others shows at The Hanover Theatre. This program is designed to give participants a public platform to share their stories and speak their truths. It offers young people a transformative experience that fosters leadership, creative agency, and an experience of community and belonging through the arts. The group meets for over 100 hours, using various arts-based activities to examine their lives as young people growing up in Worcester and to then transmute their experiences into a collaborative, ensemble theater piece. This year the entire process has been captured by Antoine Cadenz of Cadenz Films who is creating a short documentary for The Hanover Theatre in conjunction with the live stage performance.

In sharing their own perspective as an alumnus of the program, brand ambassador <u>Alyssa</u> <u>Morales</u> reflects on one of their favorite parts of the program, stating "a massive part of what makes WYSH so empowering is the audience. After every performance, during the talkback we would have people our age telling us that they've never had the courage to talk about the issues we do. Or we have older generations telling us that our show helped them understand their family members better. This year's WYSH Project has so much to say, if you're ready to listen."

<u>The WYSH (Worcester Youth Speak Honestly) Project</u> will be performed at the BrickBox, part of the Jean McDonough Arts Center (JMAC), located at 20 Franklin Street.
